HOW TO HACK THIS SERIES FOR PRETEENS

In children's ministry, you've got a wide range of ages you need to engage every week, but preteens tend to get overlooked, so here are a few adjustments you can make to this week in order to keep your preteens more engaged.

ACTIVITY | Fear Fishing

Brainstorm different fears as a groups and have the preteens write them down on the fish.

QUESTION | Have You Ever Been Scared?

Look up a few different "[phobias](#)" (both a mix of common ones and unique ones) and share them in a group. Take turns seeing if the students can pronounce them!

OBJECT LESSON | Trust Pushes Fear

If time allows, have a few different students take turns doing the activity or have enough for all of the students to do it at once.

HACKS FOR KIDS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

HOW TO HACK THIS SERIES FOR KIDS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

In children's ministry, you've got a wide range of ages you need to engage every week, but kids with special needs tend to get overlooked, so here are a few adjustments you can make to this week in order to keep your kids with special needs more engaged.

ACTIVITY | Rock, Paper, Scissors, Trust!

In this modified version of Rock, Paper, Scissors, the added "trust" component might be overwhelming for kids with special needs. When it is their turn, allow them to play the regular version of Rock, Paper, Scissors. Make sure the group cheers for the kid, win or lose.



ACTIVITY | Human Knot

Although this activity beautifully demonstrates cooperation and trust, it can be a bit challenging for kids with special needs. The proximity of bodies is very close, and this may adversely affect a kid who has sensory issues. For this same reason, holding hands tightly, without letting go, could prove to be extra challenging. It also could intellectually be confusing for the child with developmental delays.

Give the child with special needs a different role in this activity. For example, give the child with special needs the responsibility blowing the whistle or ringing the bell as the activity begins. Or, play music in the background during this activity and allow the child to turn the music on and off, and dance/move freely to the music. Be creative so that every child can participate in some way.

ELEMENTARY LESSON GUIDE



BIG IDEA

THE BIBLE

Confession and Forgiveness: Psalm 32;

LARGE GROUP TIME

WHAT? *What are we talking about today?*

MUSIC | Worship

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** *Sing a few worship songs with your kids! Choose any song(s) you and your kids like, but you might want to include one or more of the following:*

ACTIVITY | Camouflage

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** *Lead the kids in this modified version of hide-and-seek. One person ("it") stands in the middle of the room, closes their eyes, and counts to 20. Everyone else hides. Then "it," without moving from their place, tries to spot hiders and calls out the people they can see. Then "it" closes their eyes again, this time counting to 15, while everyone has to come out of hiding, tag "it" then go hide again. Game repeats with "it" counting to 10 then 5, until only 1 hider remains. (For more details, check out the [description here](#).)*
- It's fun to hide in a game, but hiding places are important because they keep us safe from danger.

ACTIVITY | Fear Fishing

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** *Purchase plastic fish or make your own out of cardboard and laminate it with*

packing tape. Write with a dry erase or washable marker on each fish to represent the things we fear. Put a paperclip on each fish and a magnet on the string from a “fishing pole” made from a dowel rod. Let the kids fish in a bucket or pool without water. After the fish have been caught, read the word on the fish and tell the kids to throw their fish into a bucket with water. The words should disappear off the fish.

✂ **PRETEEN HACK:** Brainstorm different fears as a groups and have the preteens write them down on the fish.

- We might be afraid of things, but guess what? There’s always someone we can turn to!

QUESTION | Have You Ever Been Scared?

- **Would anyone like to share a time when you’ve been scared?**
- There are lots of things you may be afraid of. The truth is, everyone gets scared. But the Bible tells us God is here to help us when we get scared!

✂ **PRETEEN HACK:** Look up a few different “[phobias](#)” (both a mix of common ones and unique ones) and share them in a group. Take turns seeing if the students can pronounce them!

THE BIG IDEA | I am not afraid because God can be trusted.

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Dim or turn off the lights in the room, and ask kids to take turns trying to frighten you! If you are not comfortable with this, just ask kids to make their most frightening faces.
- Oh wow, that was pretty scary! **What do you normally do when you’re scared?** Well, from now on, remember this Big Idea and trust God instead!
- This week’s Big Idea: **I am not afraid because God can be trusted.**

SO WHAT? Why does it matter to God and to us?

VIDEO | Sing, Episode 5

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Play this week’s [teaching video](#).

SCRIPTURE | Psalm 56; 1 Samuel 21:10-22:2

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Look up the story in your Bible and encourage the kids to do the same. Read it!
- David wrote Psalm 56 when he had been captured by the Philistines and was taken to Gath. He was so afraid of the king that he pretended to be mentally ill so that his captors wouldn’t think he was a threat, and then he was able to escape.
- Throughout this time, David remembered God, who is more powerful than any king, and wrote that he will trust God when he is afraid.
- When we are afraid, we can put our trust in God. God will always take care of us. God can always be trusted!

OBJECT LESSON | Trust Pushes Fear

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Before the kids arrive, place a glass vase on a tray. Label the vase, “YOU.” Then,

label a cup, "FEAR" and place baking soda in the cup. Place vinegar in a cup labeled, "GOD."

✂ **PRETEEN HACK:** If time allows, allow preteens to try this out on their own!

- We all have fear inside of us for different reasons. [Pour baking soda into the vase.]
- But God promises to take care of us and knowing that will help push fear out of our hearts. [Pour vinegar into the vase.]
- Everyone gets scared, but we can trust God to take care of us.

VIDEO | What's The Word: Trust

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Show [this video](#), "What's the Word: Trust" from Crossroads Kids' Club.
- **What is trust?**
- **How does someone show that they are trustworthy?**

SCRIPTURE | Isaiah 41:10; Proverbs 3:5-6

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Look up the verse and read it!
- **What do these verses tell us about God?** That's right! God is always with us! God will give us strength when we feel weak and will help us when we can't do things on our own.
- **What do these verses tell us about each other?** The verses tell us everyone gets scared! We all are afraid of something. And we can all trust God with our fears. We may know a lot of things, but we don't know everything. We can trust God knows best!

NOW WHAT? What does God want us to do about it?

ACTIVITY | Rock, Paper, Scissors, Trust!

- We are going to play a game that requires a whole lotta trust!
- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Split kids into two teams, and have each team select a representative to face off with Rock, Paper, Scissors. But before they go, each person tells the other person what they are going to put (they don't have to put what they say though!). The goal is to win, of course. But if a player won by "trusting" the other person, they get an additional point. For example: If player 1 says they will pick "rock," (and actually does "rock") and player 2 puts "paper," to win –team 2 gets a point for winning, and a point for trusting. If player 2 puts "paper" but player 1 changes it up and puts "scissors" instead, team 1 gets a point for winning, but team 2 also gets a point for trusting.
- ✂ **SPECIAL NEEDS HACK:** The added "trust" component might be overwhelming for kids with special needs. When it is their turn, allow them to play the regular version of Rock, Paper, Scissors. Make sure the group cheers for the kid, win or lose.
- **What are the different things you had to trust in this game?**

ACTIVITY | Human Knot

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Tell everyone to stand in a circle (if you have a large group, break it down into groups of 8-10). Tell everyone to put their right hand in the middle of the circle, and hold someone else's hand. Do the same with their left hands. Then, the kids will untangle themselves and make a circle again without letting go of the hands they're holding. Let one person sit out – they are going

to help untangle the group. But first, have them try untangling themselves without saying anything for about a minute before getting help.

✂ **SPECIAL NEEDS HACK:** Give the child with special needs a different role in this activity. For example, give the child with special needs the responsibility blowing the whistle or ringing the bell as the activity begins. Or, play music in the background during this activity and allow the child to turn the music on and off, and dance/move freely to the music. Be creative so that every child can participate in some way.

- This is a great example of how trust means we are willing to listen to someone else's instructions and advice instead of just trusting our own advice.

PRAYER

- Dear God, Thank you for being the one we can trust. Instead of believing what our fears say, help us to trust You and the promises you give us in the Bible. You are a good and powerful God and you are always watching out for us.

MEMORY VERSE | Making the Band

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Since this series is called, "Sing!" try different ways to sing the memory verse. This week, encourage the kids to perform the memory verse while using classroom instruments, such as a xylophone, castanets, tambourines, egg shakers, etc.
